

## PROPOSITION 1 - TRANSPORTATION



Proposition 1 focuses \$205,000,000 on 36 improvement projects to widen streets, enhance intersections, rehabilitate residential roads, improve sidewalks and trail network, and more. These projects are intended to improve transportation infrastructure, ensuring safer and more efficient travel for residents and visitors alike. **If approved, Proposition 1 would not increase the current property tax rate.**

**\$415 Million** ▶ If Propositions 1 through 7 are approved by voters, the city's current property tax rate would remain the same, and those taxes would fund improvement projects outlined in each of the first 7 propositions.

**\$53 Million** ▶ If Proposition 8 is approved by voters, it would include a temporary, 5-year half-penny sales tax increase to pay for improvements at the public sports facilities in Broken Arrow. The temporary increase would begin on July 1, 2026 and end on June 30, 2031.

## PROPOSITION 2 - PUBLIC SAFETY



Proposition 2 focuses \$56,000,000 on 12 public safety improvements in Broken Arrow, including fire stations, emergency equipment, training facilities, communication systems, and animal services. These projects are intended to maintain reliable emergency response and public safety infrastructure as the city continues to grow. **If approved, Proposition 2 would not increase the current property tax rate.**

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## PROPOSITION 3 - QUALITY OF LIFE



Proposition 3 focuses \$74,000,000 on 16 quality-of-life improvements in Broken Arrow, including parks, playgrounds, aquatic facilities, community centers, and recreational amenities. These projects are intended to maintain and enhance public spaces used by residents of all ages. **If approved, Proposition 3 would not increase the current property tax rate.**

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## PROPOSITION 5 - STORMWATER



Proposition 5 focuses \$6,000,000 on stormwater improvements throughout Broken Arrow. These projects are intended to reduce flooding, improve drainage systems, and address stormwater runoff in key areas of the city. **If approved, Proposition 5 would not increase the current property tax rate.**

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## PROPOSITION 6 - DRAINAGE



Proposition 6 focuses \$5,000,000 on drainage improvements throughout Broken Arrow by addressing creek basins and drainage areas that help manage stormwater flow. These projects are intended to improve drainage capacity and reduce flooding risks in specific watershed areas of the city. **If approved, Proposition 6 would not increase the current property tax rate.**

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## PROPOSITION 7 - LIBRARY PARTNERSHIP



Proposition 7 focuses \$4,000,000 on a proposed library project in partnership with the Tulsa City-County Library system. The project is intended to expand library access and services for residents in south Broken Arrow. **If approved, Proposition 7 would not increase the current property tax rate.**

The South Broken Arrow Library, located at 3600 South Chestnut Avenue, is 6,000 square feet and was built in 1993 and renovated in 2007. However, it has not been expanded to keep pace with the growth in the community or the foot traffic coming through its doors.

Despite its current size, the South Broken Arrow Library has the fifth highest circulation of items out of the 24 TCCL libraries. Nearly 150,000 items are used in the South Broken Arrow Library annually with more than half, 79,653, being children's items. More than 21 homeschooling groups also use the library's community meeting room for various education activities for students.

Patrons visiting the South Broken Arrow Library have increased every year since 2021, and it is expected to increase its number of visitors by 67 percent through 2026.

TCCL has a plan to construct a much-needed new library in the empty lot to the east of the current location. The new building is being designed to be twice as large as the original with an estimated cost of \$13,000,000. Features of the new building include a drive-up service window, outdoor reading area, play space for children, large community meeting rooms, flexible classroom spaces, huddle rooms, tech hub, Dr. Clarence Oliver Children's Amphitheater, and much more.

If voters approve Proposition 7, the city will sell bonds not to exceed \$4 million to help fund the construction cost of TCCL's new library plan in south Broken Arrow.



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
